Forgotten Gateway: Coming to America Through Galveston Island Kathleen Maca to Speak - May 31

GALVESTON, TX – Galveston based historian and author, Kathleen Maca will speak Friday, May 31, 3 pm, for the preview opening of the exhibit *Forgotten Gateway: Coming to American Through Galveston Island*, sponsored by Humanities Texas and Bullock Texas State History Museum, at the Galveston Railroad Museum, 2602 Santa Fe Place.

Kathleen Maca, freelance writer, photographer, historian, and author has researched and explored all facets of the island's history. Once located on Pelican Island, the Quarantine Station remains in many Galvestonian's memories.

As a major gateway for immigration, Galveston Island was the port of entry for hundreds of thousands of people coming to America from 1845 to 1924. *Forgotten Gateway* considers the importance of place in the immigrant experience tracing the history of Galveston Island as it changed from a small harborage for sailing vessels, to a major cosmopolitan steamship and railroad hub, and back to a nearly abandoned immigrant station—and explores universal themes of immigration including leaving home, encountering danger, confronting discrimination, and navigating bureaucracy.

Maca's presentation Galveston's Immigration & Quarantine Station - Harbor of Hope, will provide insight into the experiences and value of the once upon a time entry to a new life for immigrants; many who chose to settle on the island and whose families remain generations later. The presentation will be in the museum's auditorium located in the exhibit building adjacent to the Train Depot. A question-and-answer session will take place following the presentation.

Forgotten Gateway: Coming to American Through Galveston Island will be on exhibit at the museum from June 1 to August 31, 10 am – 5 pm daily. Harborside Express Train rides are available weekly weather permitting.
